# long story short ....

#### Origin and History of Knitting

It is conservatively suggested that knitting with two needles originated in Egypt between 500 and 1200AD from the discovery of cotton fiber sock remnants.

A form of knitting was commonly used by the Vikings for wool hats, socks, and purses. Knitting became an important industry in 17th and 18th century Scotland. As it did not need a loom, the whole family could do it and they had lots of sheep. It developed into an all male industry when guilds were formed to make stockings and gloves for wealthy clientele. Members went through a rigorous training period and women were not allowed in the guilds. Hand knitting was not identified as a feminine craft until the Victorian Age when industrial woven cloth became less expensive and less time consuming to produce. Only the wealthy had spare time on their hands to knit.

Knitting became a tool for espionage during the Revolutionary and both World Wars. Not only would messages be hidden in balls of yarn, but stitches developed as a type of code to pass on secrets.

World War I brought a resurgence of popularity by men, women, and children knitting large quantities of accessories for the Allied troops. Currently there is a fast growing "Hats for Sailors" program supplying hand knit caps to deployed servicemen and women.

#### Origin and History of Crochet

The true origins are undocumented. Conflicting sources range from Arabia and spreading along the trade routes, to South American indigenous tribes, to Chinese needlework that spread to Turkey, Persia and North Africa. Crochet as we know it today is attributed to European immigrants to the US in the early 19th century. However, there are some techniques of yore, that are still practiced, and are widely believed to be precursors to crochet. Among these: Shepherd's knitting and Tambour embroidery.





Shepherd's knitting, (aka Tunisian crochet) uses a hook to pull the yarn through several loops and can resemble knitting.

Tambour embroidery likely was likely from China and was introduced to the French in the 1700's. It became popular among the upper classes. The Tambour technique uses thread on fabric for a flat design whereas crochet is more three dimensional.

Both techniques are undergoing a resurgence in popularity.

**Health benefits of both:** MIT has recently unveiled a knit dress that changes shape in response to heat. (Didn't we already know that?) The rhythm and mindfulness of knitting and crochet helps with serotonin release, the chemical that helps regulate anxiety, happiness and mood. Both can be social hobbies. Any and everyone is picking up hooks and needles regardless of age, gender, or abilities. A welcome trend reawakening!
